ADVANCED TRACK

This opportunity will prepare interns to select a construction career path: union apprenticeship training, construction related post-secondary tracks, or direct entry into the construction workplace if desired. Interns visit different apprenticeship training centers where they receive training and supervision from industry experts as they complete projects using both hand and power tools.

PROGRAM REQUIREMENTS

ELIGIBILITY

- At or below a certain income level
- You must be between the ages of 14-24 upon enrollment and **MUST** have a Ramsey County address.
- All must be economically disadvantaged or "at-risk" youth.
 - Youth who are eligible to receive free and reduced school lunch are considered to be economically disadvantaged.
 - An at-risk youth may be classified as a family of one and deemed economically disadvantaged and children of dislocated workers who meet age requirements may be classified as a family of one.

AT-RISK YOUTH

For purposes of determining eligibility, the following list of individuals are considered to be at-risk:

- Pregnant/parenting youth
- Youth with Limited English Proficiency
- Potential or actual dropouts (dropout is an individual who is no longer attending any school and who has not received a secondary diploma or equivalent)
- Juvenile offenders/diversion program youth
- Youth receiving public assistance and/or group home services
- Youth with disabilities, including learning disabilities (self-attested or diagnosed)
- Homeless or runaway youth
- Chemically dependent or children of drug or alcohol abusers/dependents
- Youth with basic skills deficiency (below 8-9 grade level)
- Youth with educational attainment one or more levels below grade level appropriate to age
- Foster children
